Autogiro Inventor Designs Special 'Bug' for Transatlantic Hop

MADRID, May 9 (P)—Three Spanish aviators, all civilians, are testing their wings for solo hops across the Atlantic during the next few months.

Two of the fliers plan to cross in monoplanes while the third hopes to achieve the first transatlantic flight in an autogiro.

Juan de la Cierva, inventor of the autogiro, is reported to have designed a special plane for the young Basque pilot, Nicolas Ruiz, who hopes to prove the adaptability of the autogiro for transoceanic flight.

The proposed route of Ruiz includes six refueling stops between Spain and Buenos Aires, one in mid-ocean with the assistance of the mail ship Lufthansa anchored be-

tween the Cape Verde Islands and Natal.

If the flight is a success, Ruiz says he plans to continue up the west coast of South America to Mexico and thence to New York.

Another Basque flier, Jesus Martinez Sam Vicente, is grooming a small monoplane of English manufacture for a flight by easy stages from Vitoria to Argentina.

Residents of Vitoria, emulating those of Santander who financed the flight last year of Juan Ignacio Pombo to Mexico, have raised funds for Martinez' hop.

The third Spanish pilot who hopes to cross the Atlantic is Jose Velaz de Medrano Echevarria, resident of little Vinuesa, in Soria Province.
